





Immigration Statistics Sponsored study visa granted to main applicant globally



Who can apply?

You can apply for a UK Student visa if you are 16 or over and:

- Have an offer from an approved education institution.
- Can speak, read, write and understand English.
- Have enough money to pay for your course and support yourself.
- Have consent from your parents if you are under 18.

If you are between 4 and 17 years old and you want to study at an independent school in the UK, you may be eligible for a <u>Child Student</u> <u>visa</u> instead.



Before you apply

- Identify and apply for your course
- Check your education provider is a licensed student sponsor
- Your education provider will send you a reference number called a Confirmation of Acceptance of Study (CAS), once they've offered you a place on a course. You need this before you can apply for a visa.
- Check Gov.uk for the documents you need to prepare for your visa application
- Apply for your visa as soon as you have received your CAS number and have your documents ready

Documents required



You must provide:

- Current passport or travel document
- CAS reference number



Supplying the right documents will help avoid delays to the decision making process



You may also need to provide:

- Proof of finances
- Proof of your knowledge of English
- Birth certificate and parental consent letter if under 18
- Tuberculosis test results (if required)
- ATAS certificate (if required by course)

Funds

You need enough money to pay for your course and support yourself in the UK.

You may need to provide evidence that you have enough money to cover your living costs – how much depends on where you will be studying:

- London £1,334 for each month of the course (max 9 months)
- Rest of the UK £1,023 for each month of the course (max 9 months)

You can prove you have enough money through:

- Cash in a savings account in student or parent/guardian's name
- Student loan
- Official financial or government sponsorship or grant

Funds must have been held for at least 28 consecutive days prior to submitting your application.

Funds

You may not need to prove you have money to support yourself if:

- you've had a UK visa for 12 months prior to the date of your Student visa application you
 must currently be in the UK
- you're applying as a student union sabbatical officer
- you're applying as a postgraduate doctor or dentist on a recognised foundation programme

Differential evidence requirement

You do not need to prove you have enough money to support yourself if you are a British National (Overseas) ((BN(O)) or from one of the countries or territories listed under the 'differential evidence requirement'. However you do need to have enough funds to make an application.

Submit your biometric information (fingerprints and photograph)

Your passport will be returned to you



If successful, a vignette will be stuck in your passport. This will explain your leave, the validity dates of your visa and the conditions of your visa

OR

Application refused. UKVI will contact you to explain why. You may have a right to appeal or review UKVI will make a decision on your application

Biometric residence permit (BRP)

- You'll usually get a BRP if you:
 - apply to come to the UK for longer than 6 months
 - extend your visa to longer than 6 months
 - apply to settle in the UK
 - transfer your visa to a new passport
 - apply for certain <u>Home Office travel documents</u>



- Your BRP will include information about your identity, your biometrics, your immigration status and conditions.
- You must collect your BRP within 10 days of arrival in the UK or before your vignette expires.





• UKVI starts processing your application once you submit your application (including biometrics) on the <u>UK Immigration: ID Check app</u> or at a <u>VAC</u>.




- Processing times usually take up to **3 weeks**
- You may be able to pay to get a faster decision on your application.
 - within 5 working days ('Priority Visa service')
 - by the end of the next working day ('Super Priority Visa service')
- Applications may take longer to process, some reasons for this may include:
 - the information in your application is not accurate or requires further consideration
 - you need to provide further evidence, for example evidence of funds

UKVI will contact you once a <u>decision has been made on your</u> <u>application</u>.

You do not need to contact UKVI to track your application if you've already made a visa application and it is still within current processing times.

Application tips

- Once a CAS has been issued, apply for your visa as soon as possible to avoid busy periods/delays
- Check that your CAS is for the correct visa
- Include all necessary documents
- Include official translations of your documents
- Include a supporting letter to explain any gaps in your study for example, periods of employment
- Disclose your full travel history including visas refused
- Disclose any forms of criminality including minor offences
- Include your birth certificate and parental consent letter if under 18
- If you are using the UK Immigration: ID Check app after you have paid for your application, make sure you confirm you have submitted your documents. Your application can't be processed if you miss this step

Travel to the UK

You can travel to the UK before your course starts:

- Up to 1 week before if course lasts 6 months or less
- Up to 1 month before if course lasts more than 6 months



You must not travel to the UK before the start date given on your visa

BRITAIN & NORTHERN IRELAND

Graduate visa

- Opportunity to work in the UK for 2 years (bachelor/master degree graduates) or 3 years (PHD graduates)
- No sponsorship required

Eligibility

- Education provider has told Home Office you have successfully completed an eligible course
- Graduated from an approved institution
- Must apply in UK before student visa expires
- Pay application fee plus Immigration Health Surcharge (IHS)

Graduate visa application process

Apply online at Gov.uk Prove your identity Use UK Immigration: ID Check app to scan passport or BRP

(You will need to sign into your existing UKVI account or create a new one)

If you can't scan your passport or BRP using the app you will need to give biometrics at a UKVCAS application centre

You will receive a digital immigration status or BRP to prove your right to live & work in the UK

UK Student Visa

Changes to student visa route

Limit the right to bring dependants on the student route other than those on postgraduate research programmes;

Remove the ability to switch out of student routes into work routes before successful completion of studies and review the maintenance requirements.

The changes are effective and will apply to students starting courses in <u>January</u> 2024.

Short-term study route now allows the applicant to use financial evidence of parents or legal guardian to support their application.
